Jon- Who was your inspiration again?

Lisa – I met a man, weaving is... I've always liked weaving, doing sculptures and things. I'm very that way. When I've er used to be in the UK back in.. before the Millenium I used to teach technology so I'm always very 'hands on', woodwork, metalwork and design – I used to do a lot of computer aided design and CNC work as well and electronics..
