The website gives you the GPS co-ordinates of the hiding place and off you go to find it. What is 'it', you might ask. Well a box, large or small, into which someone has put a notebook and paper so you can record your find, plus a few other items, you can take an item out, as long as you put another one in, there are tags that need to be moved from site to site, there are multi-cachés, there are events happening world-wide.

For me, it just gives a new purpose for a walk, and an opportunity to discover new places. If you have children, it's a great afternoon's entertainment; little cost, gives them something to look for and they can bring a prize home. Perfect.
