



Vanessa's choice of Brittany

Elaine: Well, Vanessa, thanks very much for taking time to come down here today to talk to us. Obviously, you're a very much travelled lady due to your military background, but when, and how, did you discover Brittany?

Vanessa: I started exploring Brittany in about 1990 and then about 1996 I was travelling and I had my mother with me and we were in Erquy and we were at the Port having a Kir Royale and she said "Let's walk in through town" and I thought "There's a town here?" 'cos I just knew there was a beach. So we walked through town and we started looking in some of the Realtor windows and my mother said ...

Vanessa: Yes. And she said "You could afford a house here." And, being a civil servant at the time, I told her, I said "No, I can't" and she explained to me how I could and in 1997 I bought my house in Erquy

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Elaine: Did you have any problems with all the paperwork that often ensues?

Vanessa: No. Surprisingly, I didn't and I think a lot of it is due to a lady that I discovered while reading through the Central Brittany Journal by the name of Marie Geursey??? and she has a business helping, typically I would say, English people, but, being an American she thought "Well, sure, I'll help you, too" and she was very instrumental in helping me organise paperwork; going to appointments, so I had minimal problems at all. Vanessa: Well, I'm trying to integrate more and more. Having lived in Germany for 36 years I speak very good German and I'm learning French so I go to my weekly French classes and in the afternoon of the same day I go 40 minutes in the opposite direction from my house where I facilitate a conversation group for French adults at the Intermediate level, I would say. And that's a lot of fun, so we're teaching each other English and French at the same time while having fun doing it. I'm also trying to do some volunteer work with ???? so I'm going to be getting with the social welfare assistant, I believe she is, in Erquy to see if I can get something going with that. We have a 'Franglaise' group in Erquy twice a month that I'm a part of and I also, because one of my passions is cooking, I go to a monthly cooking demonstration in Erquy so not only do I get to to learn how to cook wonderful French recipes, I'm learning more French because if I don't get that right I'm not eating very good food.

Elaine: That's incredible. So, basically, you're probably wondering how you ever had the time to work, because every day seems to have some sort of, like, somewhere you've got to go; somewhere you need to be; something that you're involved with.

Vanessa: I think having a routine; having a schedule helps. Because if not, I would just be all a-gagging around the house.

Elaine: Um - future plans. Is it going to be Brittany forever?

Vanessa: Brittany forever. Yes. I have a French background. My, my paternal grandmother came from Canada. My paternal great-grandmother came from somewhere outside of Paris so, I think I'm here for the long-haul.

Elaine: It's in your blood.

Vanessa: It's in my blood.
